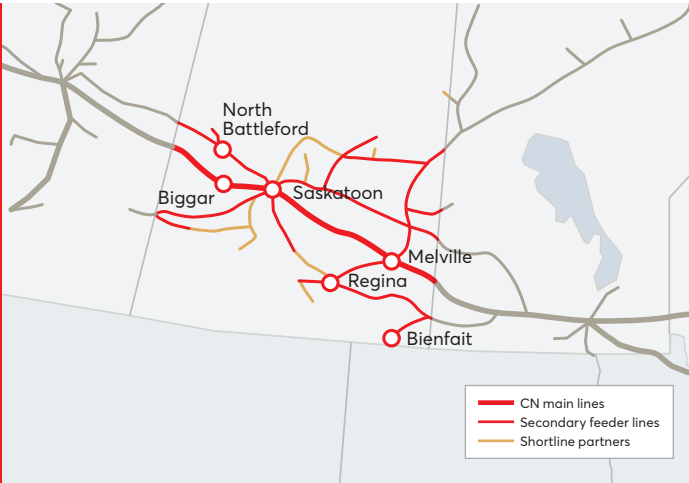

Grains and fertilizers, especially potash, make up most of the traffic handled by CN in this Prairie province. Our traffic also reflects the increasing diversification of the Saskatchewan economy by handling growing volumes of consumer goods and specialty crops through our intermodal terminal in Saskatoon and Canada's first privately operated intermodal terminal in Regina. Both Saskatoon and Regina boast metals distribution facilities. Saskatoon also has an automotive distribution centre. Melville is home to CN's largest rail classification yard in Saskatchewan where more than 350 CN employees work. In Bienfait, we have a CargoFlo® bulk handling facility as well as forest products and metals distribution centres. Finally, in North Battleford, there is an additional forest products distribution facility.

Network Investments

Over the past decade, CN has invested about \$1.6 billion to build and maintain a safe and efficient network in Saskatchewan and to support our supply chain partners. Expansion projects included rebuilding bridges and upgrading subdivisions. Maintenance projects focused on the replacement of rail and ties, plus upkeep of crossings, bridges, culverts, signals, and other track infrastructure.

Community Partnerships

In 2022, CN contributed to many Saskatchewan-based organizations, including:

ROYAL SASKATCHEWAN MUSEUM Discovered in Saskatchewan, Scotty is the largest and oldest Tyrannosaurus rex in the world. The CN *T. rex* Gallery brings Scotty to life through multiple exhibits, including the awe-inspiring recreation of the roar of a *T. rex*. The gallery includes fossil specimens of flora and fauna found in the habitat in which Scotty lived.

CANADIAN WESTERN AGRIBITION CWA is the largest livestock show in Canada. During the week, CN Police officers, Public Affairs personnel, locomotive engineers and transportation managers staffed the Operation Lifesaver® booth and had good conversations with thousands of people about rail safety. CN also supported Agribition's two-day Indigenous Agriculture Summit and Grain Expo.

SHOCK TRAUMA AIR RESCUE SERVICE STARS provides safe, rapid, highly specialized emergency medical transport by helicopter air ambulance. With STARS, those living and working in remote areas, travelling on highways, or being transported from community medical centres to major hospitals receive the very best in critical care.

BIGGAR NEW HORIZONS PROJECT Sponsored by the Saskatchewan Community Board, CN contributed to the the Biggar New Horizons Project, which operates a drop-in centre providing recreational, educational and social activities for members, including seniors and people with disabilities.

ARGYLE SCHOOL CN contributed toward the revitalization of the school's outdoor play space, which is designed to be inclusive for all skill levels and wheelchair accessible. The playground also provides a place for local families and daycare children to be active and serves as a social hub for the diverse community.
